## Rhode Island Department of Corrections Calendar Year 2021 Annual Commitment and Release Report

## **2021 Commitments**

In calendar year 2021 there were a total of **9,983** commitment events, an increase of **17%** from the previous year.

Commitments are counted as **events** rather than people. The **9,983** total commitment events recorded in CY2021 represents **6,396** people, as **755** people were committed twice and **452** people were committed three or more times.

Commitments to RIDOC were at an all time high in 2006. Since then commitments have decreased 48.6%. During that same time period, releases have decreased by about 47%. Pictured above is the Anthony P. Travisono Intake Service Center (ISC). The ISC only houses male offenders and was consequently responsible for processing the vast majority of all commitment and release events during CY2021.

## 2021 Releases


In calendar year 2021 there were a total of **9,892** release events, a decrease of **10**% from CY2020.

Since releases are counted as **events** rather than people, the **9,892** total release events recorded in CY2021 represents **6,551** people, as **714** people were released twice and **433** people were released three or more times.




Prison populations are influenced by commitments and length of stay. In RI, commitments have a great effect on RIDOC's population. When commitments exceed/fall below releases, an increase/decrease may be evident in the population. The graph above demonstrates how commitments/releases impacted the population in CY2021. For more information regarding changes in length of stay, see the RIDOC FY2021 Annual Population Report, which can be found on the RIDOC webpage at www.doc.ri.gov. Since male and female figures were relatively close together, they have been expressed below as combined. *Due to limitations found within the existing database, statistics displayed below have been computed utilizing a sample of 9,911 commitment and 9,882 release events.* 

- The average age of those committed and released was 34.
- ♦ Twenty-nine percent (29%) of men and thirty-nine percent (39%) of women were committed for non-violent offenses.
- Forty-nine percent (49%) of those committed and released were white, twenty-six percent (26%) black; twenty-one percent (21%) Hispanic.
- ♦ Only sixteen percent (16%) of those committed and released were female.
- Of the sentenced commitments, eighty-eight percent (88%) were newly sentenced and seven percent (7%) were committed due to a probation violation, yielding a ten percent (10%) decrease from last year where seventeen percent (17%) of sentenced commitments were probation violators.
- Of the awaiting trial commitments, forty-nine percent (49%) were new commitments and twenty-three percent (23%) were committed for "failure to appear" (for court).
- Of the sentenced commitments in calendar year 2021, sixty-five percent (65%) of males and eighty percent (80%) of females were sentenced to six months or less.
